Pamela R. Bennett is an associate professor in the School of Public Policy at the University of Maryland, Baltimore County (UMBC). She received her Ph.D. in sociology from the University of Michigan in Ann Arbor, where she was a Rackham Merit Fellow, a Spencer Foundation Predoctoral Fellow, and a Trainee at the Population Studies Center. Her main research interests center on social inequality as it relates to education, particularly higher education, and racial residential segregation. Her research has receive grant and fellowship support from the National Science Foundation, the Russell Sage Foundation, the Spencer Foundation, the American Sociological Association, and the Poverty Race & Research Action Council. Her work on the educational consequences of residential segregation appears in Social Science Research and that on the applicability of affirmative action policy to housing to reduce segregation appears in The DuBois Review (with Florent de Bodman). Her studies showing net black advantages for African Americans and black immigrants in college enrollment and destination over whites appear in the American Sociological Review (with Yu Xie) and Sociology of Education (with Amy Lutz). Bennett has contributed to her profession by, among other things, serving on the editorial boards of American Sociological Review and Sociology of Education.
