Student highlights

Ph.D. student **Ridwan Islam Sifat** published a collaborative full-length <u>research paper</u> titled "Adapting to change: Exploring reverse migration as a coping strategy among internal migrants in Bangladesh" in *Heliyon Journal* under Elsevier Cell Press. Additional research titled "Exploring the Impacts of Social Media on Public Service Delivery in Bangladesh" has been accepted for presentation at the Southeastern Conference for Public Administration (SECoPA) 2023 at the University of Georgia in September. This summer, he was a Graduate Summer Intern at Academic Engagement and Transition Programs (AETP), UMBC for the Summer Bridge program.

Ph.D. student **Sandya Venugopal** is currently interning with the U.S. Government Accountability Office's Forensic Audits and Investigative Service (FAIS) team.

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Ph.D. student **Grace de Oro** was selected to present at the 2023 ARNOVA Conference and has been awarded a Conference Scholarship to attend. Her presentation is titled "Bouncing Forward: Exploring Nonprofit Resilience during COVID-19 through Emergency Management." She is the current UMBC GSA President.

Ph.D. student Laura Mateczun and Professor

Emeritus Don Norris have published a <u>new primer</u> on cybersecurity, aimed specifically at elected officials and top managers in US local governments. 

Faculty highlights

Professor Loren Henderson was featured on <u>Episode 1</u> of the Minority Landowner Magazine Podcast, where she discussed her research on the problems Black farmers faced due to COVID-19 and systematic racism. Dr. Henderson is also a member of the 2023-2024 <u>Breaking the MOLD</u> cohort. Breaking the MOLD is a two-year program for leadership and development across UMBC's College of Arts, Humanities, and Social Sciences. Professor Lauren Hamilton Edwards published a paper on the use of portfolio management by large government agencies and nonprofits, and why it is rarely discussed in public administration scholarship.

Professor **Susan M. Sterett** published a <u>new book</u>: *Litigating the Pandemic.* The book explores how governance problems in the COVID-19 pandemic world (and other climate-related disasters) are reflected in litigation patterns in the US. She discussed her work and recent book on the Center for Social Science Scholarship <u>podcast</u> *Retrieving the Social Sciences.*



Professor **Pamela R. Bennett** - <u>published an article</u> in the *Harvard Education Review* on the consequences of state bans on affirmative action. Additionally, **Dr. Bennett's** <u>2022 paper</u> "Bans and Signals: Racial and Ethnic Differences in Applications to Elite Public Colleges in States With and Without Affirmative Action" was the focus of a new policy brief by Syracuse's Center for Policy Research.

Professor Emeritus **John Rennie Short** was <u>interviewed</u> by San Francisco's KCBS Radio on the idea of a singular Olympic city.

Public Policy alumnus **Joshua Michael** (Ph.D. 2022), pictured below, was <u>elected Vice President</u> of the Maryland State Board of Education.
