Student highlights

Ph.D. student Liran Laor's new article "Hoping for a Brighter Future: Making the Case for a Publicly Funded Early Childhood Education System in the United States" was recently <u>published</u> by Exchange Press in the Winter issue of Exchange Magazine. In the article, she argues that early childhood education deserves the same level of public attention and investment as K-12 education, as they are oriented toward similar goals.

M.P.P. graduate Demetrie Garner is on the Baltimore City mayor's Restitution Advisory Board as part of city's ongoing implementation of Mayor Brandon Scott's Executive Order on Opioid Restitution Funds.

Ph.D. candidate Ridwan Islam Sifat has published a commentary article in the journal Politics & Policy. His piece "AI and Public Policy: Navigating the Possibilities and Limitations" discusses potential benefits and challenges of integrating Artificial Intelligence into the policy-making landscape. He was selected to receive a Public Administration Theory Network Fellowship and as one of the recipients of the 2025 Marilyn Demorest Love of Learning Award from The Honor Society of Phi Kappa Phi at UMBC. He also received Also received 2025 inaugural Asian Culture Award in the Changemaker Category for his research on social equity and policy, and his leadership and community involvement within UMBC communities.

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Faculty highlights

Public Policy **Professors Nancy Miller, Zoë McLaren, Mir Usman Ali,** and **recent M.P.P. graduate Zach Starr** published a new working paper with the Retirement and Disability Research Center. The paper "Assessing the Prevalence of COVID-19 and Post-COVID Condition in Adults with Disabilities in the United States: A Systematic Review" explores how COVID-19 impacts the health of people with disabilities compared to the general US population, through a systematic literature review.

Professor Chul Hyun Park has published a new <u>article</u> examining the impact of a group prenatal care model that provides pregnant women with risk assessment, education, and social support.

Professor Emeritus John Rennie Short published an <u>analysis</u> of a potential fiscal crisis looming for US cities, and hosted a workshop for social science faculty on writing and publishing books.

Professor Emeritus George R. La Noue published multiple analyses of <u>recent</u> judicial developments on <u>higher-education</u> student <u>admission</u> policies in designed to promote equity.

Alumni highlights

Dr. Grace De Oro (M.P.P. '19, Ph.D. '24) recently published a <u>research article</u> in the *Journal of Public and Nonprofit Affairs.* In the article, Dr. De Oro examines reviews literature on how nonprofit organizations can define and build resilience so that they can continue to meet public needs in the face of adversity.

Dr. James P. Kruger III (Ph.D. '21) published an <u>open letter</u> to new Department of Energy Secretary Chris Wright advocating the US to adopt an integrated solid waste infrastructure that is based on the international waste management hierarchy.

Dr. Rudy de Leon Dinglas (Ph.D. '23) joined the University of Virginia School of Continuing and Professional Studies' <u>teaching team</u> as a lecturer in the Public Administration certificate program. He was named <u>#4 on a list</u> celebrating a group of outstanding public servants: the Top Influencers in Local Government.
